Sine Kragh: Approaching Portraits from Palmyra

Portraits from various Roman provinces offer an insight to local and wider geographical knowledge systems and ideas. However, terms such as domination and resistance are still central in the research and do not consider a multiple-way of transmission and exchange of traditions and ideas. The paper will address theoretical and methodological reflections on portrait traditions as well as the visuality of portraits and how these allow new ways of understanding Palmyrene portraits.
