'THE 1916 REVOLUTIONS: CONTEXTS AND CONSEQUENCES'

The Easter Rising of 1916 was a failure militarily but it changed utterly the face of Irish History. It set in train an unstoppable process, which led to the separation of Ireland from Great Britain and accelerated the demise of the British Empire, which by 1914 traversed the globe. This talk sets the 1916 Rising in a wider chronological context, looking at the rise of nationalism in Ireland from the seventeenth century. It also explores the long-term consequences of the Rising for Ireland, Britain and the British Empire.
